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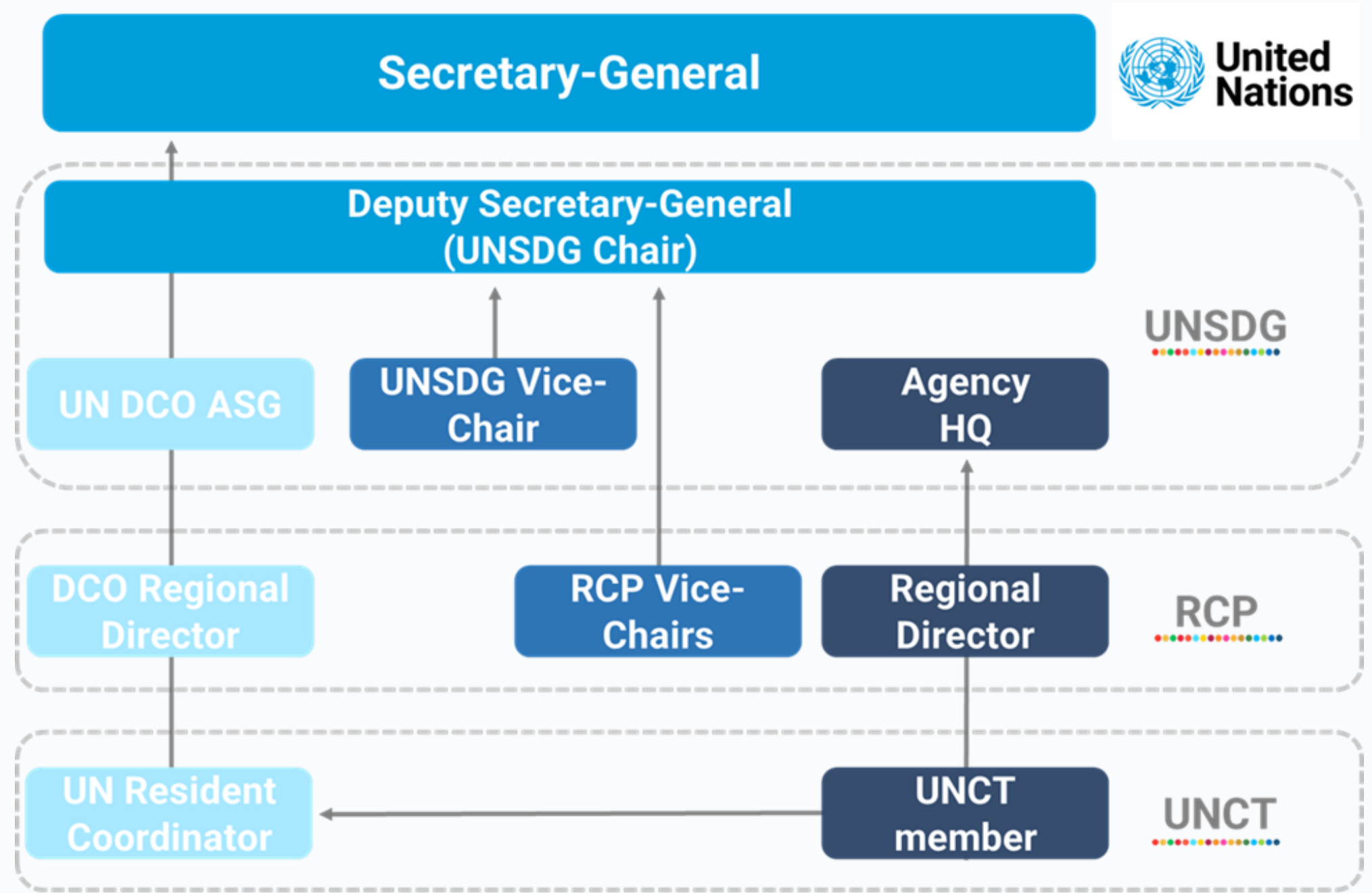

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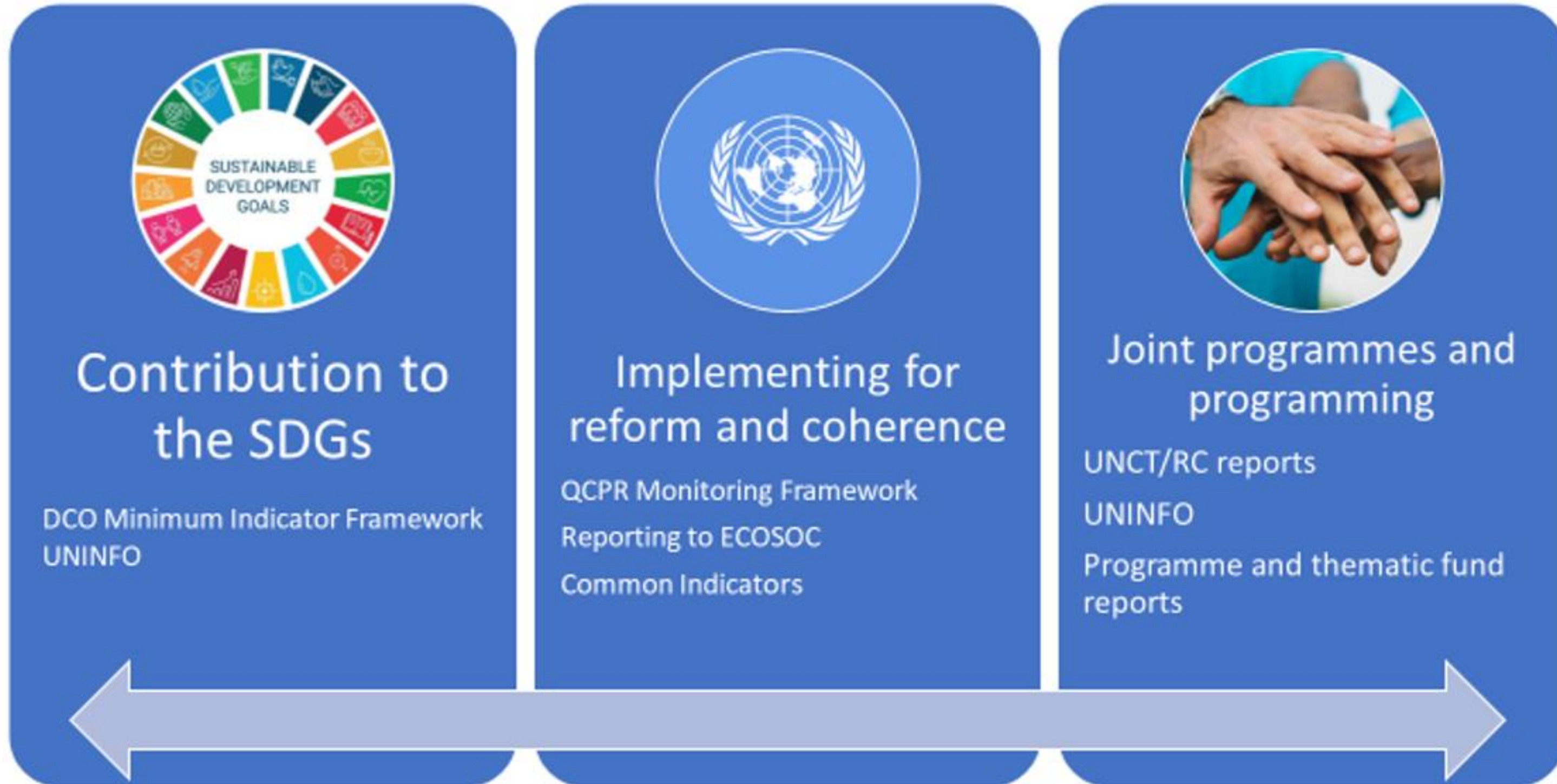

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Lessons Learned

Development results

- *Working together resulted in rethinking comparative advantages.*
- *Clear joint results, action plans and dedicated funding are critical for joint work.*
- *System-wide collaboration is necessary to address complex multidimensional development challenges.*

COVID-19

- *The COVID-19 socio-economic framework geared the system to address health and humanitarian issues, including the socio-economic impacts of the pandemic.*
- *COVID-19 called for a more robust system-wide shift to address urgent and long-term needs and scale up impact, based on comparative advantages*

Evaluability assessment

- *Confirmed stronger planning and programme implementation.*
- *Noted efficiency gains in system-wide mechanisms.*
- *Highlighted the need for linkage to all-of-system implementation and reporting*



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2022 and beyond

Agencies geared towards broadening system-wide reporting and monitoring mechanisms.



Harmonising efforts on the new Strategic Plans

- Joint consultations
- Harmonized approaches and methodology
- Work across the UN system
 - Common indicators
 - Complementary indicators



Monitoring and reporting on the Strategic Plans, including alignment to the UNSDCF

- Narrative: partnership including collaboration among UN system
- IRRFs: Common indicators
- Agency-specific contributions
- Country Programmes fully aligned with UNSDCFs



Active contributors on QCPR and UNSDG efforts

- QCPR framework (+11 indicators)
- Support to DCO and the UNSDG governance framework

EXAMPLE: COMMON OUTPUT INDICATOR

Number of countries that have endorsed a Youth, Peace and Security (YPS) framework

- Common among UNDP, UNFPA and UN-Women
- Each agency identified a group of countries with programme planning and initiation;
- Agencies met and consolidated a joint set of countries for implementation and reporting;
- Jointly agreed baseline, milestone and target values are set;

EXAMPLE: COMMON QCPR INDICATOR

QCPR: 1.4.28 Percentage of UNDS entities/UNCTs that have met or exceeded standards in at least 50% of the indicators of the relevant component of the UNDIS accountability framework: i. UNDS entities ii. UNCTs
