GENDERED NATURE OF THE HUMANITARIAN CRISIS

Women and girls in Nigeria's Northeast, particularly in Borno, Adamawa, and Yobe (BAY) states affected disproportionately

- 59% of the 8.4 million people in need of assistance, 55% of the 2.2 million IDPs, 54% of returnees, 52% of host community, 52% of inaccessible population in need are female.
- Insecurity, restriction of movement, and breakdown of livelihoods exposing women to negative coping mechanisms.
- Heightened exposure to gender-based violence
- Men and boys forcefully recruitment, killed or arbitrary detention.
- Altered intra-household dynamics and increased burden and vulnerability affected women, especially Female Headed Households.



GENDER IN HUMANITARIAN COORDINATION

2016

- Weak gender mainstreaming in the humanitarian response plan (HRP)
- Needs of women and girls not prioritized
- No gender disaggregated data
- No gender sensitive outcome /indicators

2018


- Gender in humanitarian working group
- Gender analysis integrated in HRP
- Gender and age marker (GAM) applied
- Increased capacity of 100 humanitarian actors in gender and humanitarian action

2023

- Gender-sensitive humanitarian response, with needs of different women taken into consideration-HCT Gender Strategy
- Increased capacity for sectoral analysis
- 649 service providers with capacity to apply GAM
- Coordination mechanism established for WLOs leading to 30% funding allocation
- Borno, Adamawa and Yobe State LWLO Strategic Plan


