CSW68 AGREED CONCLUSIONS – A PROGRESSIVE OUTCOME DOCUMENT

- Reaffirmed the importance of women's and girl's full, equal and meaningful participation and decision making in addressing poverty
- Underlined the importance of strengthening institutions and financing with a gender perspective
- Called for significantly increased resources from public and private sources, strengthening the international financial architecture to enable countries to mobilize resources
- Called for increased aid to address women and girls' poverty





CSW68 AGREED CONCLUSIONS – A PROGRESSIVE OUTCOME DOCUMENT

- Called for the implementation of gender-responsive economic and social policies
- Noted that robust, flexible, multi-year financing for women's rights organisations and movements is critical to address poverty
- Called for strengthening national capacity to collect and use disaggregated data on multidimensional poverty







FOCUS AREAS - UN WOMEN SUPPORT TO IMPLEMENTATION

Fostering equitable fiscal pacts

•Redistributive economic policies including labour policies Progressive taxation policies

•Increased official development assistance targeting gender equality

•Diversified public and private investment

•Effective international cooperation to avoid illicit financial flows and tax evasion

Accessing high quality public services

•Strengthening institutional representation and capacities to deliver public services

•Enhancing citizen state accountability for service delivery

•Building trust in institutions and rebuilding the social contract

•Implementing and monitoring gender responsive budgeting

•Providing essential services for women and girls experiencing violence

Promoting genderresponsive social protection systems

•Alleviate income poverty across the life course

•Improve education, health, and nutrition outcomes

•Prevent gender-based violence, early marriage and adolescent pregnancy

•Promote women's access to decent jobs and sustainable livelihoods

•Progressively achieve higher levels of protection

Recognizing care as a public good

•Reduce women's income and time poverty

•Create decent jobs for women in the care economy and facilitate economic participation

•Ensure women benefit from transformation of work towards sustainable economies

•Center development alternatives on care for people and planet

•Adopt climate resilient policies that strengthen the climate-care nexus

IMPLEMENTING CSW68 AGREED CONCLUSIONS – PRELIMINARY FINDINGS


- UN Women offices and teams supporting implementation in a variety of ways:
 - Using CSW68 to accelerate advocacy and programming and initiate new work.
 - Some governments developing action plans and other mechanisms for follow up with UN Women support; engaging UNCTs
 - Engaging UNCTs, linking normative commitments to Strategic Notes and
- AWPs.

- Strong focus on partnering to operationalize the CSW68 agreed conclusions: expanded partnerships with traditional and non-traditional partners
- Leveraging technical and thought leadership in substantive areas, strong relationships with government incl. women's machineries, coordination role and leadership on GE in UNCTs, recognised advocacy and leadership in normative space.



IMPLEMENTING CSW68 AGREED CONCLUSIONS – PRELIMINARY FINDINGS

- Almost all UN Women offices and teams supporting delivering high quality accessible services.
- Most supporting gender-responsive social protection and recognising care as a public good. Two-thirds supporting fostering equitable fiscal pacts.
- Top sub-areas: gender-responsive budgeting, access to jobs and decent livelihoods, women's income and time poverty, and prevention and response to violence

BUDGETS FOR EQUALITY

- Gender-responsive budgeting
- Gender tracker Public investments and expenditures for gender equality.
- Joint work with Women's Civil Society Organizations, and governmental institutions at the national and local level



CARING CITIES

- Support to the National Government in the design and implementation of the National Care System
- Strengthen local care initiatives –call for proposals for WCSOs
- Leverage LNOB principle: Indigenous, afro-decendent, women with disabilities

- Investment of the State Budget into Gender Bonds


CARE AS A PUBLIC GOOD

Created decent jobs for Women in the care economy and facilitated economic participation by

- Administration of the President included childcare as one of the top three accelerator initiatives
- Care Economy as a pillar of Economic Policy (draft) until 2030



HOW DID WE ACHIEVE THESE TRANSFORMATIVE RESULTS





- Facilitated the dialogue and built trust between Private sector actors and Government (data, research, advocacy, networking, partnership)
- Gender Bonds –as the first ever Social Bond in the Kyrgyz Republic, followed later by Green Bonds and others thanks to UN Women's facilitation
- Technical assistance to develop the state's first-ever conceptual base on Care Economy
- Policy makers full buy-in and conviction about Care Economy as a way out of Poverty, and advancement of Gender Equality
