





High-Level Panel on a resilient and fit-for-purpose UNAIDS Joint Programme



Main Objective:

 Recommendations for a resilient and fit-for-purpose Joint Programme that builds on successes of the HIV response and responds to evolving epidemic

Timeline:

- 2023: UNAIDS Board Decision Point 6.5
- 2024: Panel deliberations and report
- 2025: Reflections on the Panel report by UNAIDS EXD, CCO and UNAIDS Board

Burundi, Lesotho + other countries

Support to **gender-responsive HIV policies and institutions** resulted in the new National Strategic Plans for HIV in Burundi and Lesotho prioritizing outcomes on ending gender-based discrimination and violence against women.



Indonesia

The engagement of the national network of women living with HIV ensured that gender equality and human rights issues of women, including those in key populations, were prioritized in the request for funding to the Global Fund.



Tajikistan

Support to advocacy by the network of women living with HIV to **reform the criminal code** led to an updated evidence base.



Global

The Strategic Dialogue on Gender Justice in the HIV Response at the 25th International AIDS Conference increased the visibility of women's organizations and created opportunities for advocacy for women's priorities.

South Africa and growing

The Young Women for Life Movement has grown to over 3,000 members and reached tens of thousands of other young women with information about HIV. It is now expanding to Botswana, eSwatini, Lesotho and Namibia.
