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Introduction


The Black Womxn Caucus (BWC) is a youth-led feminist organization based in South Africa. BWC is currently leading a sub-regional capacity-building program for young feminists, focusing on the UN Commission on the Status of Women. This report is a result of consultations with the youth feminist cohort from South Africa, Zambia, and Eswatini. Additionally, BWC is an active member of the Generation Equality Forum as a Commitment Maker, South Feminist Futures and the Action Coalition on gender based violence. BWC also participates in monthly webinars coordinated by the UN Women and also the NGO Forum of CSW. The Black Womxn Caucus (BWC) initiated its youth feminist capacity-building program in 2023, and it continues to be held annually virtually as in the form of monthly webinars.

The Status of Women in the Subregion with regard the Beijing Declaration Critical Areas

The state of gender-based violence and femicide in South Africa is alarming. According to the South African Medical Research Council, between 2020 and 2021, 5.5 women were killed by intimate partners per 100,000 women. This translates to a femicide rate that is significantly higher than the global average.

In terms of the 12 critical areas of concern outlined in the Beijing Declaration, South Africa is struggling to make progress in several key areas. Findings from the consultation revealed that Women and Poverty, Women in Power and Decision Making as well as Violence Against Women are key areas where the Subregion has a challenge towards realisation of equitable women's rights.

Violence Against Women

Violence against women is a pervasive global issue. According to the World Health Organization, 30% of women experience violence from their partners. Women also face harassment and assault in public spaces and educational institutions. It is crucial for us to unite in eradicating violence against women and children.

Women and the Economy

Women's economic empowerment is essential for achieving equality and fostering development. In South Africa, women encounter significant challenges, including limited access to education, training, and credit. Women are underrepresented in leadership roles and often earn less than men. Efforts to advance women include organizations like Swaziland Rural Women Assembly, Women Unlimited Eswatini, and Crossroads International. These groups support gender equality, women's rights, and provide assistance to survivors of gender-based violence. Additionally, national policies and international commitments, such as the African Women's Protocol, play a significant role in promoting women's rights.
