2019 Select Results in 6 Areas of Collaboration

48 million people with better access to <u>basic</u> <u>services</u>





118 countries conducted
Beijing+25 review for
empowerment of women and girls



28 countries strengthened policies and plans with focus on disaster risk reduction and increasing <u>climate resilience</u> of social services

Over 100 countries established intragovernmental SDG coordination, budgets, monitoring and evaluation frameworks for greater use of disaggregated data



62 million women and young people in 31 priority countries
utilized integrated sexual and
reproductive <u>health services</u>



59 country offices contributed to peace and social cohesion, primarily through the socioeconomic dimensions of peacebuilding



Results Tracking in 2019

Example: prevent & respond to violence against women & girls

Joint Efforts:

 Legal frameworks(e.g. Domestic Violence Bill Law in Liberia)

- National systems (e.g. Government's commitment, standard operating procedures, and protocol in Cambodia and Jordan)
- Capacity building (e.g. capacity of police in Tanzania)
- Advocacy (e.g. youth-focused advocacy tool, and Beijing+25 in Arab States)

Results:

266 legislative reform initiatives undertaken, with about half addressing laws and practices with provisions discriminating against women

1.2 million women and girls subject to GBV accessed essential services, including 5,300 disabled women and girls

118 countries conducted a 25-year review and appraisal of implementation of the Beijing Platform for Action




