
The following two pages capture UNICEF's performance on UN-SWAP 2.0 indicators for 2019.


Areas for improvement

- In 2019, UNICEF met or exceeded requirements for significantly more indicators than both the average for the Funds and Programmes and the overall UN system.
- In addition, UNICEF did not miss requirements for any indicators.

UNICEF, COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS OF RATINGS BY YEAR



In 2019, UNICEF met or exceeded requirements for 88 per cent of the performance indicators, a 12 percentage point increase from 2018. Additionally, the number of indicators that approached requirements has declined by half, from 4 indicators in 2018 to only 2 in 2019.
