The European Union's support to specific programmes resulted in...



In Nepal, in 2018, a group of conflict-affected women launched a national

online advocacy campaign, sharing personal stories and demands for truth, justice, dignity and reparations. The campaign has begun to shift the national dialogue around sexual violence, lift decades of stigma and shame, and open up potential avenues for justice for victims and survivors.



More than 500 women, girls, and members of marginalized communities

in Albania (persons with disabilities, Roma and Egyptian women, and LGBTI community members) are better informed on various forms of violence and services available to victims of violence in their areas through information sessions.



Women coffee producers of the International

Women's Coffee Alliance from Brazil, Costa Rica and Jamaica concluded business in LAC and EU for an estimated amount of USD 1.2 million and expect to conclude business for more than USD 5 million in the future, thanks to the Win-Win Programme.



In North Macedonia, over 300 women victims of

violence received free gender-responsive assistance – including legal aid, legal representation, psychosocial counselling, and group therapy.



In 2018 and 2019, UN Women strengthened the capacities of 39 national women's

machineries and 395 women's organizations to advocate for and monitor gender-responsive plans and budgets.



Through the Spotlight Initiative, UN Women supported United Nations Resident

Coordinators in 27 countries to lead the development of comprehensive programmes to address violence against women and girls, including harmful practices.



Between 2018 and 2019, progress in addressing

violence against women in politics has yielded 63 initiatives, encompassing legal reforms, dedicated policies and innovative tools developed with UN-Women's technical assistance.



Since 2012, other resources of USD 292.2 million have allowed UN Women to strategically focus

on ending violence against women and girls, support women's political leadership and participation, peace and security, and women's economic empowerment.

Banner photo: Nearly 80,000 of the Syrians who have escaped the deadly war raging in their country have sought shelter at Jordan's largest refugee camp, Za'atari, where UN Women provides economic empowerment and protection programming for women and girls. Operational since 2012, to date, UN Women runs three 'Oases' safe spaces for women and girls, which receive approximately 5,000 visitors per month, of which close to 1,000 are regular users. The spaces offer economic opportunities, protection referral services, day care services – to allow parents to work, and life skills such as Arabic and English literacy and computer classes.
